Schedule Changes

Effective November 29, 2021, changes will be taking place in the daily instructional schedule in an effort to address bus driver shortages by re-routing current transportation trips. Specifically, the following will be implemented beginning November 29:

1. Current K-5 transportation runs will be re-routed.
2. All K-5 students will be picked up and dropped off at their designated location at the same time.
3. Current staggered morning arrival times at both schools will be eliminated.
4. Alden Primary School student school day will shift to 9:05 a.m. - 3:45 p.m.
5. There will be **NO** change to the Intermediate School start time. Arrival time will remain at 8:35 a.m. Student dismissal will shift to 3:15 p.m. (A 10-minute change).
6. There will be **NO** change to the Middle School start time. Arrival time will remain at 7:55 a.m. Student dismissal will shift to 2:20 p.m. (A 10-minute change).
7. There will be **NO** change to the High School start time. Arrival time will remain at 7:45 a.m. Student dismissal will shift to 2:10 p.m. (A 5-minute change).

Distinguished Alumni Ceremony



Dr. Dana L. Wymer, DO, FAAP
Class of 1985




A 1985 graduate from Alden, Dana Wymer graduated from the University at Buffalo with a Bachelor of Arts in Architecture and a Master of Science in Engineering. She worked in engineering for 12 years before pursuing her medical degree. Wymer graduated from the Lake Erie College of Osteopathic Medicine and completed her residency in combined internal medicine and pediatrics through Buffalo General Hospital, Children's Hospital of Buffalo, and ECMC. She served as chief resident in her fourth year. Wymer was active in the National Med-Peds Residents Association, during which she was instrumental in bringing and organizing the Northeast conference to Buffalo for the first time ever. She is Board certified in both internal medicine and pediatrics, and is the managing physician partner of Quaker Medical Associates in Orchard Park, N.Y. Additionally, she is a member of the American College of Physicians and the American Academy of Pediatrics. She serves on both the boards of the Optimum Physicians Alliance and the Primary Care Independent Physicians Association, which serve to promote quality in primary care. She has been married for 30 years to her husband, Michael, and has a 24-year-old son, Riley. When not at the office she enjoys traveling, biking, cross-country skiing, cooking, and music.

Mr. Nicholas M. Smith
Class of 1986



Nick Smith is a 1986 graduate of Alden High School. After graduation, he enlisted in the U.S. Navy and attended boot camp at the Great Lakes Naval Training Center in North Chicago, IL. Upon completion of his training, he was assigned to the USS O'Bannon (DD-987) home ported in Charleston, S.C. While stationed aboard the O'Bannon, he completed a six-month Persian Gulf deployment and numerous other naval deployments throughout the world. During his military service, he was awarded the Navy Achievement Medal, Good Conduct Medal and Meritorious Service Medal. Upon completion of his military commitment, Smith enrolled at Buffalo State College, where he earned his Bachelor of Science in Forensic Chemistry. In 1997, Smith was hired by the U.S. Secret Service as a special officer, and two years later was selected to become a protective support technician on the vice president's (VP) detail. During his time on the VP detail, Smith drove in motorcades and provided security for vice presidents Al Gore and Dick Cheney, and was also a driver for Mrs. Gore and Mrs. Cheney. During the 9/11 terrorist attacks, Smith was stationed at the White House and provided security for Vice President Cheney and his family. Desiring to return to his hometown, he joined U.S. Customs and Border Protection in the Port of Buffalo. In 2007, he became a firearms and less lethal device instructor that was responsible for conducting training for the officers stationed in the Port of Buffalo. Smith has completed five 100-mile charity bike rides for the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children and has participated in other community service events. He has two daughters, is an avid outdoorsman and enjoys local sporting events.

Mr. Terry D. Arndt
Class of 1971



In the summer of 1971, Terry Arndt took his first road trip. Arndt said he was going nowhere in particular, but just wanted to meet new people from different cultures and backgrounds. From the beginning, he was passionate about the diversity of people and places. All in all, he experienced 69 countries over the span of the next 13 years. Arndt's passions led him to the exploration of environmental sciences. In 1987, he started his prerequisite classes at the University of Buffalo. He later transferred to the University of Miami, where he received a double Bachelor of Science in Biology/ Marine Biology with a minor in Chemistry in 1992. Arndt started his 25-year career working with environmental companies in Miami right after graduation. In 1996, he landed his dream job out of Anchorage, AK. He received training through the National Marine Fisheries Service and worked for the federal government as a fisheries observer aboard boats in Alaskan waters. He was stationed aboard vessels that would go to sea for up to 90 days at a time. Every vessel was mandated to have an observer. Each boat had a permit for what was legal during that season, and the Observer needed to be certified for that type of permit. Arndt was one of very few who was triple certified, and Arndt was a protected species observer or marine mammal observer. In 2007, he began working with LGL Alaskan Research Associates. His occupation was to identify as many animals as possible and document their behavior. The boats had strict instructions to avoid interactions with animals; whether that meant going in another direction or waiting for the animals to move on. If the vessel ignored the

Observer's advice, they risked getting their permits revoked, shutting down all operations in that sea and costing them millions of dollars. Understandably, the observers were not always liked; they were given a secret code to send in with weekly reports, which they would then relay to the U.S. Coast Guard, if they felt their lives were in danger. Arndt's job was to ensure that all work was completed legally and ethically. From 1996 to 2006, he worked in the Gulf of Alaska and the Bering Sea aboard several of the vessels featured in The Discovery Channel's "The Deadliest Catch." In 2017, Arndt was forced into early retirement when he was diagnosed with amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS) or Lou Gehrig's disease. Throughout his life, he journaled all of his travels and his work as a marine biologist and at this time took the opportunity to write his biography "The Extraordinary Adventures of an Ordinary Guy." He passed away January 12, 2020. Some of Terry's Arndt's final words were "I've lived an amazing life."

Winter Weather School Bus Safety



It's November, which means that winter will soon be here, and construction season is over! The buses are ready, and the snow tires are on! Along with the holiday planning and preparations, will come the cold temperatures, snow, ice, and less daylight. This change in season means additional cold weather safety precautions for students who ride the school bus and the drivers that travel the same streets.

Cold Weather Safety Tips for Students and Parents:

1. **Dress appropriately for the weather.** Wear coats, hats, gloves and boots. Make sure your hats or face coverings don't obstruct vision, and boots can be easily walked in. Also, try to find outerwear that is brightly colored and reflective for better visibility to drivers.
2. **Allow extra time to get to the bus stop.** If the sidewalk or street is covered in snow and ice, students will need to walk more slowly to get to their stops. Students should put down their phones and look in the direction they are walking.
3. **Do not play rough at the bus stop.** Please stay off of snow piles and don't push or shove; doing so could cause students to fall on the ice and become injured.
4. **Cross 15 feet in front of the bus.** If it's snowing, the driver may have more trouble seeing students, so make sure to leave plenty of room.
5. **Use the handrail when getting on and off the bus.** The steps are likely to be slippery from snowy boots.
6. **Be weather aware.** Bad weather can lead to school cancellations, delays, or early dismissals. Make sure your school has your contact information so that you will be able to receive alerts, and always be sure to check the school website or local media when inclement weather is expected.

Cold Weather Safety Tips for Drivers:

1. **Slow down!** This is a good rule of thumb for any winter driving situation, but it's especially important when driving near school zones or buses. Driving on ice will mean less time to slow down and stop for students or other vehicles.
2. **Turn your headlights on.** It may be more difficult to see students in snowstorms or cloudy weather.
3. **Pay attention.** Again, it's another good rule for any season, but it's especially important in winter. Don't use your phone or change the radio, but keep your eyes on the road at all times. Students are unpredictable - especially in the winter. Remain alert for children who may be hidden or standing in or near the street at the bus stop due to the mounds of plowed snow.


Exploring Mystery Bottles

JV Girls Soccer



ACS Athletic Wall of Fame

On October 8, 2021, we were able to celebrate, in person, our Class of 2020 Athletic Wall of Fame Inductees. It was a pleasure to finally celebrate the athletic accomplishments of the following four inductees as well as their accomplishments post athletics. We would like to congratulate our inductees on this honor.

Rawle L. Gardner

Class of 1965

Rawle L. Gardner was a three-sport athlete playing football, basketball, and baseball from 1961-1965. Gardner was not only noted for his athletic ability, but also his leadership, as he was nominated a captain in all three sports. In football, he was selected to the Division III All Star Team and The Buffalo Evening News-Erie County Conference Division III All-Star Football Team. In basketball, Rawle led Alden to the Division III Championship and was selected to the Erie County Conference All-Star Cage Team. Cortland State University awarded Rawle Gardner a scholarship as a baseball catcher, which he had to turn down as he was drafted into the U.S. Army. In the Army, Gardner was a radioman in Vietnam and was honorably discharged. He had a passion for athletics and Alden, and he could often be found running passing and catching drills in his neighborhood. Rawle passed away November 24, 1974, but his legacy lives on.

Nancy (Kruszka) Bennett

Class of 1988

Nancy (Kruszka) Bennett demonstrated outstanding athletic skill as an Alden High School student-athlete. Her love of athletics can be seen to this day as a physical education teacher (Akron Central Schools) and a coach (Akron CSD and Alden CSD). Nancy's heart still bleeds blue and gold as she coaches the Alden Varsity Boys Swim team and is the assistant coach for the Alden Varsity Girls Track team. Her dedication to athletics is a trademark of hers, acting as the Section VI Cross-Country Girls chairperson.

The record book was rewritten by Kruszka's work on the track. Upon her graduation, Kruszka held three school records (200-meter dash, 4 x 100-meter relay, 4 x 400-meter relay) and tied one more (100-meter dash). She was chosen as an All-League selection in 1986, 1987, and 1988. In 1987, Nancy and her teammates placed second in the 4x400 at the Section VI championship in Niagara Falls. Her career continued in college and so did her accomplishments. She was named MVP at Erie Community College in 1989 and 1990, and competed at Nationals in the 200, 400, and the 4x400.

Her love for sports and teaching led Kruszka to the professional world as an educator and coach. Nancy's coaching accolades include coaching for the Buffalo State Bengals, where they earned a regional cross-country title and sent an individual to Nationals in the long and triple jump under Kruszka's leadership. Kruszka's career took her back to coaching high school athletics. As the Akron Tigers Cross-Country coach, her teams have earned six league and nine Sectional titles. Coach Bennett has had 12 individual runners make N.Y. State Championship appearances. Akron Cross-Country has made four state appearances under her leadership. Coach Bennett coached Akron Track and Field from 1998 to 2016, leading the team to six league and 10 Sectional titles. She has had two State Champions (400-meter hurdles and discus).

Coach Bennett returned to her alma mater in 2016 as the Girls Track and Field assistant coach, and Boys' Varsity Swimming coach. In 2019, Alden Varsity Swimming earned its first league title in decades and repeated the feat in 2020.

Jaime Wallace

Class 2010

Jaime Wallace was a three-sport athlete participating in bowling and specializing in cross-country, and track and field. Wallace set the bar high in cross-country and track and field, as an athlete and a team captain. Wallace was one of the few females to be named captain of Alden Cross-Country

and Track and Field for four seasons and also earned the Letterman Award in both sports for five seasons. Wallace competed in cross-country from 2005 through 2009 earning ECIC Division III First Team five times. She also was the 2005 Class B Sectional Champion, Class B State Medalist five times, a NYS Federation Qualifier five times and medaled twice. Wallace was also an All-Western NY First Team five times, an All-State Class B First Team two times, an All-State Class B Second Team three times and, in 2008, earned All-American status at Nationals. Jaime currently holds the school record on Alden's home cross-country course with a time of 17 minutes and 47 seconds. In track and field, Jaime currently holds the school record in the 2000-meter steeplechase with a time of 7:25:97 and earned All-American status in 2009 in the 2000-meter run and 3000-meter steeplechase at Nationals. Wallace also earned Section VI State Qualifier Honors for Division II in 2006. Wallace continued her athletic career at Canisius College running cross-country, indoor and outdoor track. Alden is honored to have Ms. Wallace volunteering for the past three seasons as an assistant cross-country coach.

Terry Zoeller

Class of 1964

Terry Zoeller graduated from Alden in 1964 where he lettered in football, wrestling, and track. In 1964, Terry earned the prestigious Bill Kelly award for best all-around athlete in Division III. Zoeller earned this award based on his athleticism, as well as his student leadership. In 1963, as co-captain, Zoeller's run gave the Bulldogs a 16-7 victory that earned the Bulldogs a share of the division championship. Zoeller also placed second at the All-Section VI Wrestling Tournament. Zoeller was offered several offers from local colleges to play football, but chose Iowa State University to pursue civil engineering. Zoeller firmly believed he was a student first and athlete second. An injury at Iowa State sidelined Zoeller, where he decided to move to the completion of his academic career to mechanical engineering at Indiana Institute of Technology.

❖ **YOUR CHILD IS SYMPTOMATIC:**

Children who are displaying symptoms of a COVID-like illness must:

1. Remain home.
2. Contact the nurse BEFORE taking your child for any COVID testing.
3. If your child is placed on COVID protocol, there are **three** ways your child can return to school:
 - a. Provide a negative NAAT (PCR) test. Currently, we are unable to accept rapid tests from any other sites other than the Erie County Department of Health (ECDOH)

OR

 - b. Provide a doctor's note with an alternative diagnosis

OR

 - c. Stay out of school for 10 days starting from the day symptoms began.

❖ **YOUR CHILD IS A CLOSE CONTACT:**

If your child has been deemed a close contact of a positive COVID case either at home or at school and is not fully vaccinated, we ask that they remain home and that you please:

1. Contact the school nurse.
2. The Department of Health (DOH) will contact you to gather information on your child, such as any symptoms, vaccination status, etc.
3. The DOH will then provide a letter with your child's last day of quarantine notated.
4. You will need to provide this letter to the school nurse before your child can come back to school.
